## Example Words

Final Syllables: -tion, -sure, -ture
This week, we will look closer at the final syllables of words, particularly those with the final stable syllables -tion, -sure, and -ture which are pronounced as: -tion $\rightarrow$ /shen/; -sure $\rightarrow$ /sher/; -ture $\rightarrow$ /cher/.

## [ Week Two

## Double Consonants (VCCV)

This week, we will be talking about words with the VCCV ( $\mathrm{v}=$ vowel, $\mathrm{c}=\mathrm{consonant)}$ spelling pattern. This pattern has two consonants in the middle, creating the "double consonant" spelling pattern. Looking at each word's syllables, VCCV words are "divided" between the two consonants.

## Words with / $\mathrm{j} /$ and /s/

This week, we will be exploring words that end in -le, -al, -el, and -er. These endings are pronounced as:

\text {-le and -el } \rightarrow \text { /el/ } \\
\text {-al } \rightarrow \text { /l/ or /el/ } \\
\text {-er } \rightarrow \text { /er/ }
\end{gathered}
$$
